UNIDROIT's role in harmonising International Private and Commercial Law

Japanese perspectives on key instruments, with a focus on the Mining,
Agricultural and Construction (MAC) Protocol to the Cape Town

The International Institute for the Unification of Private Law (UNIDROIT), the Japanese Ministry of Justice (MOJ) and the Japan Construction Equipment Manufacturers Association (CEMA), is pleased to invite stakeholders to a consultation workshop on UNIDROIT instruments that harmonise international private and commercial law. The workshop will cover several important UNIDROIT instruments and projects. The purpose of the workshop is to bring together legal experts and private sector representatives to discuss the legal and economic impacts of these UNIDROIT instruments, and the potential benefits and costs for Japan.

The Convention on International Interests in Mobile Equipment (Cape Town Convention) and its Aircraft Protocol represent two of the world's most successful commercial law treaties. The Cape Town Convention has brought large commercial benefits to its 86 Contracting States and industry. As an extension of the Cape Town Convention, the economic benefits of the Mining, Agriculture and Construction (MAC) Protocol are significant. Over a ten-year period, the MAC Protocol is predicted to increase the global stock of MAC equipment by \$90 billion and increase global GDP by \$30 billion dollars. If widely implemented, the MAC Protocol will improve the cross-border legal framework in the Asia-Pacific region and facilitate access to credit, regional trade, improve productivity, and boost economic development.

As a leading country involved in the negotiation of the MAC Protocol and a country that exports over \$15 billion USD worth of MAC equipment annually, Japan is well positioned to be a major beneficiary of the MAC Protocol once it enters into force. This workshop will explore how the MAC Protocol will affect Japanese industry, and the important role that Japan can play in supporting the implementation of the MAC Protocol.

The workshop will be held in English and Japanese with simultaneous translation. This workshop will allow for both in-person and remote participation and participation is free of charge. Attendees can register their participation at <https://forms.office.com/r/CndnpMrMbP>.
